Dear Supervisor Mary N. Piepho:

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Town of Discovery Bay Community Services District ("District") and the residents of Discovery Bay, I am writing to you today about community concerns relative to proximity of the Byron Boy's Ranch to Discovery Bay. As a result of the recent escape of four (4) Camp wards, the District received several suggestions from the Board and members of the community at its September 21, 2011 Board of Directors meeting.

The Board and residents were surprised to learn that the Ranch facilities are not fully secured and are not completely enclosed by fencing. Consequently, the question was raised whether the Ranch should consider fully enclosing and securing the facility to avoid future escape attempts and provide improved sense of safety for nearby residents?

Additionally, the reverse 911 telephone call that was made to residents notifying of the escape arrived a full three (3) hours after the actual escape took place. While the District and its residents are grateful the County operates the reverse 911 emergency call system network, we would like to encourage the county to improve response times and endeavor to notify residents of emergency situations in a more timely fashion.

Raise Sewer Manholes and Water Valve Covers on Various Streets within Discovery Bay

Recommended Action

Approve lowest responsive quote from JW Backhoe & Construction for Phase #1 of \$18,950 to raise a total of seventeen (17) Sewer Manhole covers and seven (7) water valve covers on various streets located within Discovery Bay and authorize the General Manager to execute all contract documents.

Executive Summary

In 2010, the Contra Costa County Public Works Department performed a roadway rehabilitation project throughout Discovery Bay. As a consequence of that project, there are a number of sewer manholes and water valve covers that are now below the pavement surface. This variation in depth creates a poor surface for vehicles, and more importantly, creates long term pavement deterioration. While the County owns the roadways, the District owns the valves and manholes, and is responsible for their long term maintenance and upkeep.

The District sought bids from five (5) companies to provide a quote to do the above work. Only two (2) of the five (5) contractors responded. There are seventeen (17) sewer manholes and seven (7) water valve covers that are approximately 1" to 2" below the existing roadway surface. The project cost for this phase of the work is \$18,950.

This letter is an informational notice of the U.S. Postal Service's intent to conduct an Area Mail Processing (AMP) study of mail processing facilities to determine whether consolidation of some operations is appropriate.

The Postal Service is facing some of the most difficult challenges in its history. The current economic downturn and continued diversion of mail to the Internet has led to a dramatic 20 percent decline in mail volume since 2007. The decline in mail volume has also meant a decline in postal revenue. As a result, today the Postal Service has not only more equipment, personnel and facilities than it needs to process a decreasing amount of mail, but also less revenue than it needs to cover the costs of that large processing and delivery network.

The economic reality demands that the Postal Service reduce its network. Aligning postal facilities and resources with the demand for postal services by consolidating postal operations and placing equipment and employees where needed makes sound business sense. To do otherwise would be fiscally irresponsible.

Information about the AMP study process and the facilities that will be studied is available on www.USPS.com. Public input is being solicited as part of the study process and will be considered in the decision-making process. In communities where the Postal Service's initial review supports the business case for changing mail processing operations, public meetings will be held.
