C. DISCUSSION ITEMS

1. Discussion Regarding the Installation of Two (2) Monitoring Wells at Cornell Park. Water Engineer Justin Shobe advised the Committee of the need to install two monitoring wells. As part of a Groundwater Sustainability Agency (GSA), the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) requires Town of Discovery Bay to produce a Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP). The GSP will establish an outline for long-term groundwater basin viability. Town of Discovery Bay has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with seven other agencies that draw water from the East Contra Costa County Subbasin (ECCC Subbasin) to collectively produce this GSP. The SGMA requires ECCC Subbasin be monitored using groundwater monitoring wells. In working with staff, Cornell Park was identified as the ideal location to place these two monitoring wells.

Water Engineer Justin Shobe stated the two wells would be two inches in diameter and approximately 15 feet deep and 30 feet deep. They can be drilled and completed in one day causing minimal noise to nearby residents. Funds from the Prop 68 Grant have been awarded and will be used for this purpose. It is staff's recommendation to have the Committee allow this Agenda Item to be presented to the Board of Directors for review and possible approval.

Committee Chairs asked clarifying questions about the requirements of the monitoring wells.

Committee agreed to recommend this item to the Board of Directors.

2. Update on Community Center Pool and Landscaping.

Recreation Program Supervisor Monica Gallo provided an update on the Community Center Pool. The Tile on the pool has been completed. The Tuff Shed has not been delivered and Recreation Program Supervisor Monica Gallo is waiting to hear back from the vendor. Adam's Pool is ready to set the concrete around the pool decking. Shortly after that, inspectors will be called in. Currently, everything remains on schedule to open the Community Center Pool by the end of September 2021.

Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman gave an update regarding the installation of synthetic turf around the pool. The price of synthetic turf has substantially increased. Originally, Town of Discovery Bay obtained an estimate of \$55,000, \$81,000 with contingencies for synthetic turf. On July 28, 2021, two vendors provided bids for the project. One bid was \$113,000 and the other was for \$166,000. Staff is seeking guidance regarding the substantial jump in price and recommends reviewing the possibility of laying gray landscape fabric for weed control and postponing the project until after Winter 2021 to see if prices in materials drop. Chair Bryon Gutow asked if the bids submitted provided a breakdown in prices or if bids were submitted with a lump sum amount.

Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman advised the bids were entered with a lump sum. Committee Chairs would like to see the bids broken down per charge to better understand the quotes given by vendors.

Vice-Chair Ashley Porter asked if the request for expedited service had an impact in the increase of cost. Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman replied that this could be a factor in cost estimate. Vice-Chair Ashley Porter asked if it was possible to re-bid this project to request a breakdown of cost of work, materials.

General Manager Mike Davies advised that he would raise that question to Legal Counsel.

3. Discussion Regarding Contracting with the California Conservation Corps for Landscape Services. Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman advised the Committee that the Landscape Department has been short a landscaper for a year. In an effort to be fiscally cognizant, the option to hire a crew from California Conservation Corps (CCC) was assessed. The CCC provides a crew leader and three corps members between the ages of 18-25 years old for an annual cost of \$49,850. This expense is not subject to prevailing wage. Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman will oversee and provide direction for all the work. The services they will provide include mowing, detailing, tree and shrub care and fertilizing in Town parks. The areas of concentration include the Community Center, Slifer, Regatta and Cornell Parks. In winter months an installation crew can help with street-scaping and other installation duties. Staff recommends moving forward with the hiring of a corps crew for the maintenance of Town parks in lieu of hiring another Town landscaper and present the option to the Board of Directors at the Board meeting on August 18, 2021.

Vice-Chair Porter asked about the proposed schedule for the corps crew.

Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman advised they will work Monday through Thursday.

Chair Gutow asked if the Town will need to provide equipment for the crew to use and a tentative start date. Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman advised the corps members have all their own equipment and are able to start once the Board approves the contract.

Committee Chairs commended Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman for his diligence in saving the Town money and creative thinking in resolving the Town's landscaping team's shortage saving the Town \$15,000 annually.

Vice-Chair Porter asked for an update on the status of the Proposition 68 Grant for Clipper Linear Park. Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman advised he met with someone and a decision regarding the Town's application for the grant will be made in September 2021.

Chair Gutow asked for an update on the Discovery Bay Blvd islands.

Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman advised the irrigation on the islands will be turned off to intentionally stop anything from growing. This will help prepare the islands for new plants in the fall. Vice-Chair Porter asked for the Town to inform the community of this plan to prevent calls regarding lack of maintenance on the islands.

General Manager Mike Davies advised the public will be notified.

E. DISCUSSION ITEMS

1. Discussion Regarding Parks, Landscaping, and Community Center Project Funding Availability. Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman gave the committee an update on a list of potential projects selected to review and prioritize.

Vice-Chair Porter expressed concerns regarding strategic spending.

Discussion between staff and Chairs regarding future plans and the need to use financial resources in potential landscaping for future construction plans. The use of the Ball Wall at the Community Center was discussed.

General Manager Mike Davies reminded the Committee that using any funds from the Hofmann account will need Board review and approval.

Committee Chairs directed staff to obtain quotes for projects which will need priority consideration.

Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman advised the Committee that Cornell Park requires attention.

One of the most crucial repairs will be needed on the rubber flooring of the playground area.

Chair Gutow stated the replacement of the rubber flooring at the playground will need to be addressed quickly to prevent any safety concerns.

Committee Chairs agreed with the four items presented as requiring repairs or replacement at Cornell Park. The items mentioned are baseball field enhancements with new backstops, irrigation pump, playground surface tear out and replace with a better product and sports field lawn rehabilitation.

Discussion between Committee and staff regarding bathrooms at Cornell Park. There has been graffiti and vandalism plaguing Cornell Park.

General Manager Mike Davies advised of possible new legislation stating a requirement to keep park bathrooms open 24 hours a day for use by the homeless.

Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman advised the Committee of interest in replacing landscape along Seal Way and Sand Pointe island.

Chair Gutow advised that priority should be placed on projects along Discovery Bay Boulevard and along Willow Lake Road first.

Update was given regarding the string lighting on Discovery Boulevard and Highway 4.

Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman expressed interest in landscape enhancements along the Ravenswood Parks corners.

Chair Gutow recommended seeing what Pantages does once they start their project and then decide if the Town wants to coordinate with their plan.

General Manager Mike Davies reminded the Committee that the Conservation Corps team has begun working at the Town parks.

Chair Gutow issued a reminder to staff to do their part to keep the Town looking good. If things are out of place or an area needs attention, do what you can to rectify that.

2. Discussion Regarding Rebidding of Synthetic Turf – Community Center Pool.

Parks and Landscape Manager Bill Engelman explained the draft timeline for rebidding synthetic turf at the Community Center Pool. The bids will be marketed towards synthetic turf specialists.

Keep earphone volume low enough to hear what's going on around you. Stay alert outdoors.


Don't be predictable. Mix up your routes and schedule. Choose paths that are well lit at night.


